What is Kinship?

When children cannot live safely with their parents, we believe that a family or community member who understands the history, community and/or culture of the child should be considered to give comfort and safety to those children.

The Benefits:

- Children are more comfortable living with people they know, trust and have some connection to.
- The family's cultural and ethnic identity is supported.
- Children may be able to remain in their own community.
- A child's sense of belonging to a family is often enhanced.

Kinship Service allows a child welfare agency to provide services that ensure safety for a child, in circumstances where the child is not in the care of a children's aid society and remains within his/her family or community. Staff thoroughly screen and assess prospective caregivers to evaluate the capacity of the family or community member to care for the child in a safe home environment. Whenever possible, the assessment takes place before the child moves into the kinship home. It includes:

- completing criminal record and child welfare record checks on any person over the age of 18 living in the home;
- a personal interview with the proposed caregiver;
- a private interview with the child (depending on the child's age and developmental capacity; and
- a thorough assessment of the home environment.

Kinship Care is provided for children who are in the care of a child welfare agency and are placed with a member of their extended family or community. The standard for assessing and preparing prospective kinship care families is the same as for evaluating all foster or adoptive caregiver applicants.
